

Shuttle Facility Tour Article

Besides the traditional Florida attractions vying for your vacation time, for those with an airplane there is the Shuttle Facility Tour. Vic Krause flew his Cessna 180D to KEVB (New Smyrna Beach) to pick me up and to talk about taking the tour over lunch. It was an outstanding day for flying and the procedures are pretty straightforward.

Just stay clear of their airspace until you have established radio contact with the tower and then simply asked permission to enter the airspace to do a low pass over the runway. The tower is open Monday to Friday, weekends it's closed so check the notams any activity. When the tower is closed, use caution and fly as if the airspace is E, and you know E means EVERYONE, so it can be busy. There are GPS approaches for RWY 33/15 but it's not the same descent profile that the Shuttle flew.

It was decided that I would fly the tour heading south so Vic could take video. After the course reversal Vic would fly the tour north giving me an opportunity to take photographs.

Looking back on the photo's I took in Feb 2001 with a film camera.

Before 9/11/2001, NASA would let you fly down the middle of the shuttle runway down to 500'. You talked to NASA tower and asked for the "Shuttle Facility Tour." NASA also posted when they were going to roll out a shuttle to the launch pad. It's about 4 miles from the VAB (vertical assembly building) to the pad. The crawler does a little less than 1mph. Knowing this I flew down to the space center and asked to fly the Shuttle Facility Tour and was granted a few fly-bys. I took this photo out of the side window.
